Prayer & Worship

Currently there is scaffolding inside the church building which unfortunately might need to remain for some time. However, we are hoping to open the church again soon on *Wednesdays and Thursdays* (subject to volunteer helpers). This will be for prayer and also for visitors. (On Wednesdays between 10am and 11am the church will only be open for prayer.)

We respectfully request that ALL visitors wear a face-covering and use the hand sanitiser. Please be aware that it is not possible to clean the church every day – so we ask people not to go beyond the roped-off areas, and to avoid touching things unnecessarily.

We will be continuing our 9.15am Sunday services in the church building and (on most Sundays) our 11am Sunday services over the internet and by telephone. (On 26th December there will be no services and on Sunday 2nd January there will only be one service: at 10am in the church building.)

Services

Sunday services in church at 9.15am

Sunday morning services in church continue at 9.15am (except on 26th December, when there is no service, and on 2nd January when the service will be at 10am). <u>Holy Communion will on 9th and 23rd January</u>.

There is now no need to pre-book. In order for us to keep everyone safe – and as a way of caring for others - we ask you to wear a facecovering whilst inside our building and to give other people space. If you would prefer more space, the pews on the left-hand side next to the north wall are intended to provide more social distancing. We ask you to keep your face-covering on whilst singing.

(It is important that if you have a cough, temperature or any other sign of infection you stay at home.)

11am Sunday services via the internet or telephone

These half-hour 'live' services, where we share in worship together at home, will continue for the time-being.

(In due course we are hoping to link this in with our other services in church.)

<u>A Christmas Carol</u> by Christina Rossetti (1830-1894)

In the bleak mid-winter Frosty wind made moan, Earth stood hard as iron, Water like a stone: Snow had fallen, snow on snow, Snow on snow, In the bleak mid-winter Long ago. Our God, Heaven cannot hold Him Nor earth sustain: Heaven and earth shall flee away When He comes to reign: In the bleak midwinter A stable-place sufficed The Lord God Almighty Jesus Christ. Enough for Him, whom cherubim Worship night and day, A breastful of milk And a mangerful of hay; Enough for Him, whom angels Fall down before. The ox and ass and camel

Which adore.

Angels and archangels May have gathered there, Cherubim and seraphim Thronged the air; But only His mother In her maiden bliss Worshipped the Beloved With a kiss.

What can I give Him, Poor as I am? If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb, If I were a Wise Man I would do my part,— Yet what I can I give Him, Give my heart.

(This was originally written as a poem in 1871 and was later adopted as a hymn in 1906, by Gustav Holst. It has since become one of the nation's favourite Christmas carols.)
